Negotiations work!

2015 saw two international agreements reached that will make peace more attainable.

Most recently the COP meetings in Paris produced an <u>agreement</u> for the international community to work together to keep the warming of Earth to 2° C, while hoping to keep the temperature even lower. Critics will argue that the agreement is not binding enough, nor does it include reparations. But all nations were able to come to an agreement, and this is huge. Additionally, a fund will be set up to help poorer nations. Furthermore, nature itself is acknowledged as part of the solution expanding and saving forests are particularly helpful in storing carbon, rather than releasing it to the atmosphere. While President Obama is credited with good leadership,

he also made it clear that subjects like reparations to poorer countries affected by rising waters would not be discussed.

The second agreement to be celebrated in 2015 is the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA.) The P5 +1 (the five permanent members of the UN Security Council plus Germany) negotiations with Iran also worked out a deal that while it has fallen from the headlines, appears to be in the process of full implementation. Few believed an agreement could be reached (if you read popular press reports), but the work of disarming Iran of its nuclear weapon capability is underway. Current crisis between Saudi Arabia and Iran could jeopardize progress, but let us pray the agreement stands and progress continues.

The agreement makes it imperative that both the US & UK live up to the spirit of the nuclear nonproliferation agreement and begin to reduce the stockpiles of nuclear weapons by the nations who possess them. (see Stop Trident, below)

January is Trafficking Awareness month

Monday, January 11th is Human Trafficking Awareness Day in the U.S.

UK Human Trafficking Centre

The UKHTC is part of the <u>Organised Crime Command</u> in the NCA. It works in a coordinated way within the UK and internationally. Our work to combat human trafficking involves a wide range of partners and stakeholders. We protect the public, target the traffickers and reduce the harm caused by human trafficking.

The UKHTC's partners include police forces, the Home Office and other government departments, the UK Border Force, the Gangmasters Licensing Authority, international agencies, non-governmental organisations (NGOs) and many charitable and voluntary expert groups.

Close Guantanamo

January 11 is also the 14th anniversary of the opening of Guantanamo prison in Cuba by the U.S. military. Friends from Witness Against Torture, many from various Catholic Worker communities, are gathered in Washington DC from January 4 through January 12 to protest the



continued imprisonment of the 105 men remaining in Guantanamo prison, 49 of who have been cleared for release. Some have been cleared for release for many years but remain in prison, held without charge or trial.

All are welcome to join the demonstrators in prayer and fasting especially on January 11 (most participate in a liquid-only fast during the entire duration of their time together.) If you would like to receive daily updates

Support for these demonstrators is one small way to show our solidarity with Muslim brothers and sisters across the globe.



January 15 is Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King's birthday. It will be celebrated in the USA as a national holiday on Monday January 18. Perhaps you might honor his memory this day write a letter or note to one of your legislators opposing the plan to spend hundreds of billions (£ or \$) upgrading the nuclear capabilities of either nation.

27 February, 2016 there will be a Stop Trident demonstration in London. You can <u>sign up on Facebook</u>, and you are encouraged to invite friends.

Stop the Tesoro-Savage oil-by-rail export terminal

In late December, Congress lifted a decades old ban on exporting US crude oil to foreign countries. The oil businesses hope to be able to export oil the US no longer needs. One area to be affected is the Pacific Northwest where plans are in the works to build an oil export terminal on the coast that would allow exports to China.

In the spirit of the COP agreement, it is desirable, if not necessary, to keep fossil fuels in the ground in order to achieve the goal of limiting global warming to 2° C. Use this link to voice your objection to lifting the export oil ban.

The plan to transport highly volatile crude oil by rail cars from North Dakota to the Northwest coast poses inherent dangers from oil spills and explosions.

ICE Raiding the Homes of Immigrant Refugees

The LCWR issued a Resolution to Action for the Fall of 2015 entitled, "We are Called to End Family Detention". This is excellent background material for you to be able to voice opposition to the current actions of



Immigration and Custom Enforcement (ICE) that authorizes raids on the homes of immigrants who fled the violence in El Salvador, Guatamala and Honduras and who fled to the United States in 2014-15. The raids began on January 1, 2016. ICE hopes to deport all of these families back to the countries from which they fled the violence. Closing Thoughts

In his <u>Peace Day Message for Jan 1, 2016</u>, Pope Francis notes a danger of being well informed about crises in this world of ours:

Some people are well-informed; they listen to the radio, read the newspapers or watch television, but they do so mechanically and without engagement. They are vaguely aware of the tragedies afflicting humanity, but they have no sense of involvement or compassion. Theirs is the attitude of those who know, but keep their gaze, their thoughts and their actions focused on themselves. Sadly, it must be said that today's information explosion does not of itself lead to an increased concern for other people's problems, which demands openness and a sense of solidarity.



It is my hope that these NewsNotes will not add to the glut of information but encourage and enable simple actions that will connect the reader with the sufferings of people in our global neighborhood. There is always something we can do, even as individuals, to make this world a better place, and to speak Peace, especially when the language of hate seduces the media.
